	Mr Thompson continued to explain the SEND support in the classroom and how the HELM group operate within the academy.  HELM (helping everyone learn more) is a small group of students with complex SEND who are taught at Tuxford Academy, however not all students with complex SEND needs follow this curriculum only those identified for the HELM.  Why is reading a priority – Mr Hardy	
	The principal stated how imperative it is for children to be able to read. Students need to have a reading age of 14 to assist them in taking examinations. Students who struggle with reading at primary school are targeted too. The academy has developed a reading strategy and a reading team to support this priority.  These focus on the following areas:	
	<ul> <li>assessment and intervention</li> <li>Star reader tests taken 3 times per year.</li> <li>The reading ages of students are shared with all teachers via Class Charts</li> <li>If assessments show that some students need more support, small</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Pollyteach</li> <li>North Notts College</li> <li>Ms Leatham-Pugh confirmed the Academy operate a 'one size does not fit all' policy. Not all providers are academic some are therapeutic, and some provide blended provision. Ms Leatham-Pugh confirmed there has been a significant rise in students accessing AP both at the academy and nationally. With a 15% increase of students accessing Anxiety Related Non-Attendance) (ARNA) which operates from Diverse Academies Head Quarters and is run by enhanced intervenors. Ms Leatham-Pugh continued the centre is quality assured annually for safeguarding etc, student progress is QA once per half term.</li> </ul>
	A governor asked if the academy feel parents are more challenging than in previous years. Mr Thompson replied, since Covid 19 parents are more forthcoming regarding student education, with more challenging requests. Parental expectations are higher it is about managing them. The picture is similar across the Trust. Mr Thompson added, there are long waiting lists for the support of outside agencies which is increasingly frustrating for all concerned.
	A governor asked how students are assigned to the HELM group. Mr Thompson replied, students are normally assigned to the group through the transition process from primary to secondary education. Ensuring the packages offered are right for each student, enabling future proofing for the students next destination.
	A governor asked if the Focus Centre was always full, and what is the average length of stay a student will be schooled there. Ms Leatham-Pugh responded it varies for individual students. More often it is for a short period of weeks, but some students have attended for a longer period, including a blended timetable. Packages are constantly being reviewed to ensure transition takes place. SLT meet every two weeks to assess each student and their planned reintegration to the Academy.
	A governor asked are there more year 11 attendees at the Focus centre.  Ms Leatham-Pugh confirmed this was the case due to Covid 19 and a number of in year transfers.
	A brief discussion took place regarding transport to and from the alternative provision providers. To conclude in theory, it is the academy's responsibility to transfer students if it is the academy choice and if it is the parents' choice it is the parents responsibility.
	A governor commented it was wonderful to observe the energy in the room at the SEND coffee morning. It would be even better if the SEND coffee morning could be built into the transition week planning. Mr Thompson replied the Academy are currently looking at the coffee morning being an element of the transition week.
	A governor asked in terms of children's reading age being included on the class charts within school, is it possible for parents to have sight of this. The principal replied it is a guide as to where the student is at, to observe

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
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	and to make progress. The principal stated parents could have sight of the reading age, however, it would need context behind it. Individual conversations would be much more beneficial to enable parents to support children at home with reading.
